Electricity Usage Up Among Atlantic City Electric Households

Today, technology has made great strides in giving consumers more energy-efficient products, but those great strides could be getting swallowed by a growing appetite for electricity.

In fact, Atlantic City Electric residential customers are using, on average, 16.7 percent more electricity today than what they used a decade ago. That statistic, though, shouldn't come as a surprise considering today's larger-sized homes, oversized televisions and fascination with electronic gadgets.

In the global market, there is a direct connection between the world's increasing demand for energy and its rising costs, particularly when supplies are down. That's why the consumer's best weapon against rising energy prices is conservation. If you use less, you not only pay less but you demand less and, therefore, you are impacting the overall global market in a positive way.

This spring, as the weather turns warm, take the following steps to help save energy - and money - in your home:

- Set your thermostat between 75 and 78 degrees to save on your home cooling costs.
- Turn off your window air conditioner when you leave the room for several hours.
- Don't place lamps or television sets near your air conditioning thermostat. Heat from these appliances is sensed by the thermostat and could cause the air conditioner to run longer than necessary.
- Use duct sealant or aluminum tape to seal cracks between each section of an air duct on your central air conditioning, heat pump or forced-heating system.
- Open the windows on cooler days, and during cooler hours when humidity levels are low.
- Clean or replace air conditioning filters according to the filter manufacturer's directions.

Celebrate Electrical Safety Month, Stay Safe Year-Round

May is Electrical Safety Month - a good time to celebrate safety and remind ourselves to practice electrical safety year-round. Electricity is dangerous as electrical shocks kill nearly 400 people in the U.S. every year and injure thousands more, according to the Electrical Safety Foundation International.

As the weather gets warmer, many of us will be spending more time outdoors, planting trees, boating, painting the home, all of which have the potential for causing us to come in contact with electrical wires and lines. Here are some valuable tips for staying safe around electricity:

- Never touch a power line with your body or an object, such as a ladder. Coming into contact with a power line can result in serious injury or death. If you see a downed line, assume that it is live and call Atlantic City Electric at (800) 833-7476.
- Teach children to never play around power lines, electrical substations and other electrical equipment.
- Do not fly kites or model airplanes near power lines.
- Protect outside electrical outlets. Make sure that your outside outlets have a ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) to protect you from potential shock.
- When working near power lines always make sure there is at least 10 feet of clearance between the lines and yourself and any equipment you may be working with.
- Always wear shoes when using outdoor electrical equipment.
- When boating and you come near power lines make sure there is at least 10 feet of clearance between your boat, including masts, and power lines.
