DID YOU KNOW?

Q: Is the energy for a lamp or light still used if the light switch is on, but the bulb is either burned out or unscrewed?

A: No, energy is not being used for a lamp or light when the bulb is unscrewed or burned out. The reason why is because the bulb completes the electrical circuit between the lamp switch and the outlet. Without the bulb, the circuit is not complete and, therefore, energy is not being used.

KNOW HOW TO PREVENT CO POISONING



As the temperature gets colder and heating systems get turned on, Atlantic City Electric recom-

mends its customers have a qualified contractor inspect their fuel-burning appliances and piping to ensure that carbon monoxide is being properly vented to the outside.

Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless gas that can be deadly. We recommend that homeowners

consider installing carbon monoxide detectors in their home to prevent poisoning. Often there is little time before poisoned victims experience symptoms that limit their ability to seek help. Some of the symptoms include: headache, dizziness, weakness, nausea, rapid heartbeat, loss of hearing, blurry vision, vomiting, seizures, unconsciousness, respiratory failure and cardiac arrest.
