

Use Power Tools Safely

When using power tools to clip hedges, mow the lawn, or make outdoor home repairs, follow these safety tips.

- Wear or use the right personal protective equipment such as safety glasses, a dust mask, gloves, or safety boots.
- Never pull or jerk the cord from the outlet's power supply.
- Don't leave an electric tool running when not in use – turn it off and unplug it. Always store it in a dry place.
- Never use electric tools in wet or damp locations unless approved for that use and connected to a ground fault circuit-interrupter (GFCI).
- Don't plug several tools into one outlet, which could overload the circuit.
- Never carry a power tool by the cord.

Atlantic City Electric recently posted an improved outage map application on our Web site that provides greater information on outage status and restoration progress.

The new map is more interactive than the previous version and visually richer. You can zoom in as close as one mile from the actual power outage.

By “hovering” your mouse over a location, you will see outage details such as the number of customers without power, ZIP codes affected and crew status information.

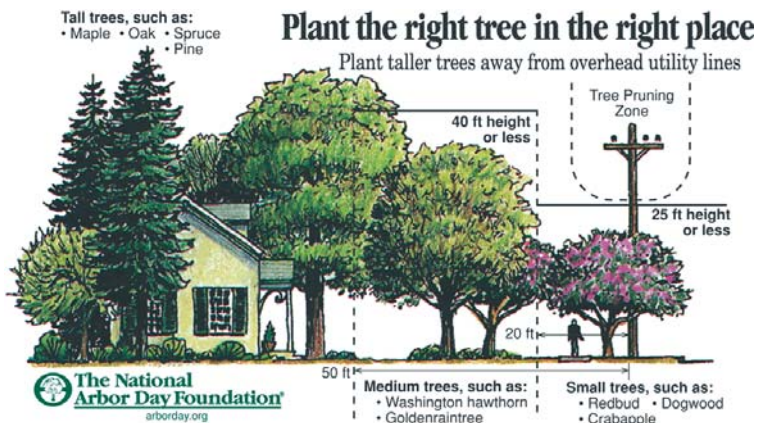

- Turn off electronics and lights when you leave the room.
- Use the microwave to cook meals because it uses less power than a conventional oven.
- Unplug "energy vampires" such as cell phone chargers, TVs and computers when not in use.
- Use ceiling fans to help reduce the need for air conditioning and heating.
- Insulate your home; wrap water heater and pipes.
- Replace incandescent light bulbs with ENERGY STAR® qualified compact fluorescent light bulbs, CFLs. If every household in the U.S. replaced one light bulb with a CFL, it would prevent enough pollution to equal removing one million cars from the road. Learn more at earthday.gov.

Learn How to Plant the Right Tree

Trees are great for the environment. They provide shade to reduce the need for air conditioning, and they absorb carbon dioxide (CO₂), which makes our air healthier to breathe. But it's important to plant the right tree in the right place to reduce the potential for power outages. Keep these tips in mind:

- Trees that grow tall should never be planted near power lines.
- Never trim a tree that is growing near a power line. Consult a professional.
- Don't plant trees or shrubs near power poles. Doing so could hamper the flow of electricity, and may slow or interfere with the restoration process in the event of a power outage.
